
Integrated working

- The NHS Long Term Plan sets out clear ambitions for greater integrated working
- What makes us healthy is a broad and complex picture
- Integrated across health and care, local authorities and the third sector
- The Long Term Plan puts strong emphasis on integrated multidisciplinary teams – Primary Care Networks
 - **Collaborating** with all other providers in the local health and social care system
 - **Sustainable** into the longer term
 - **Enhanced services** via the network
 - **Additional practice staff** to support Primary Care Network delivery



Primary care networks – key to the future

- Primary care networks are small enough to give a sense of **local ownership**, but big enough to have **impact** across a 30-50K population.
- They will comprise groupings of clinicians and wider staff **sharing a vision** for how to improve the care of their population and will serve as **service delivery units** and a **unifying platform** across the country.




Introducing Primary Care Networks

31 January 2018	Primary Care Networks (PCNs) announced by NHS England based on evidenced models
Feb-May 2019	PCNs develop from the building blocks of GP practices to cover population of 30-50,000. Each PCN develops a Network Agreement and appoints a Clinical Director
1 July 2019	19 PCNs covering Oxfordshire through a national template contract PCNs offering coordinated Extended Hours Access
First year	PCNs appointing clinical pharmacists and social prescribing link workers
Future	From 2020/21 PCNs must collaborate with non-GP providers through their Network Agreement.

i. Structured Medications Review and Optimisation

PCNs will be able to access funding for these additional roles, starting from the date shown:

2019/20

- clinical pharmacists
- social prescribing link workers

2020/21

- Physician associates
- First contact physiotherapists

2021/22

- Community paramedics

Ongoing development

- NHS Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group (OCCG) holds contracts with all 19 PCNs
- OCCG and partners have arranged development activities for PCN teams, including joint working with community services
- OCCG is working with the County Council to gather and present data to support PCNs in understanding and planning for local needs
- Community and patient engagement in development – varying approaches to reflect local opportunities
- HealthWatch Oxfordshire have initiated the Oxfordshire Wellbeing Network
- OCCG developing arrangements to enable PCNs to engage in health and social care planning across Oxfordshire and Thames Valley.
